It being proposed in the Report  
of the Select Committee of the Legislative  
Council on the Newcastle Lighthouse of which  
I enclose a copy that Hobby's Island break  
down to the level of sixty-five feet above the  
high tide mark leaving or creating as may  
be found desirable a parapet of six feet  
high round the edge of the rock to protect  
the dwelling and the base of the light house  
from the effects of the wind I am directed  
by His Excellency the Governor General to  
request that you will have the goodness to  
favor me with your report on this proposal  
stating particularly how far it complies with  
it would interfere with the work at present  
in hand. —

Sir,

I have had the honor to receive  
your letter No. 53/20, dated the 31<sup>st</sup> Ultimo,  
accompanying a Report of the Select Committee  
of the Legislative Council, proposing that  
Tabby's Island be cut down to the level of  
65 feet above the high tide mark, leaving  
or erecting, as may be found desirable, a  
parapet of 6 feet high to protect the dwelling  
and the base of the light house from the  
effects of the wind; and requiring, by direction  
of His Excellency the Governor General my  
report, particularly as to how far in  
compliance with it would interfere with  
the work at present in hand. —

2. They in reply state, that on

the arrival here of the boarders  
daily expected from Cockatoo Island about  
30 men could be spared for the purpose of  
cutting down Hobby's Island without  
materially interfering with the works at  
present in hand, but in this case an  
additional free overseer would be absolutely  
necessary to superintend the detached party,  
and their dinners must either be sent  
ready cooked from the Gaol, or a cooking  
place be established on Hobby's, the distance  
from thence to the Gaol being too great for  
the men to return to their dinners without  
much loss of time. —

3. I have this day visited Hobby's  
and to the best of my belief it would  
occupy 30 prisoners for nearly 3 years to cut  
it down to the height proposed; and therefore  
I would beg to suggest (as the erection of the  
lighthouse as speedily as possible is considered  
of great importance) that the whole strength  
of this Establishment should be employed  
on this work, with the exception of a few  
men to be continued in facing the Wharf  
and removing ballast, the party at Hobby's

being

being at all times available to fill up any  
material breached which might from time  
to time be caused in the Breakwater. -  
Indeed much of the Stone to be on Hobby's  
might be removed with great facility and  
advantage to the Breakwater, there being  
a tramroad already and the distance  
short. -

4. There is a building on Hobby's  
which would answer the purpose of a cook-  
house, and there is also a keep-shed - all  
therefore that would be required, would be  
a couple of Boilers, those at the Coal being  
required for cooking the breakfast.

Sir, Sydney, 30<sup>th</sup> December, 1853.

Dear Sir,

In attention to your letter No. 33  
of 1st January, we do ourselves the honor to report for the information of His Excellency the Governor General the progress that has been made in the operations at the Nobbly Rock at Newcastle.

2. It being necessary to lodge charges at the points A, B, C, and subsequently probably at D, as indicated on the accompanying tracing, galleries have been driven in from the face of the rock at No. 1, to a distance of 77 feet, and at No. 2 to a distance of 79 feet.

3. The rock as the drift or gallery proceeded inwards from the face has a proportionally increased in density and

hardness, which circumstance combined with the inexperience of the prisoners - employed as miners has retarded this part of the operations.

4. The portions colored red in the plan indicate the extent to which the galleries have been completed, that colored yellow what remains to be done. -

5. Some difficulty at first was experienced in obtaining the requisite length of wire and some small but necessary material for the galleries arrangements, but these have all been procured, and the Blattoy and its appearance can now be at once completed. -

6. - We are informed that there is a <sup>large</sup> supply of Blasting Powder in charge of the Colonial Storekeeper to supply the demand for the operations in question. -

7. - We therefore recommend that Major Macpherson should be instructed

to

to expedite the work at the Galleries  
by every available means in his power  
and that additional labor if requisite  
should be supplied to him expressly for  
this purpose. —

(formerly an Island) called Nobbys, which  
is of the most important service in  
sheltering vessels entering with southerly  
gales: and further is a most eligible  
position for a light-House.—

That your Memorialists have  
been informed that it is intended to

destroy the said Promontory by means  
of Gunpowder, and two chambers are  
already excavated in it for that purpose.

That your Memorialists believe  
that there is danger of obstructing the  
entrance to the Port (the channel being  
already exceedingly narrow) by the  
destruction of said promontory.

Your Memorialists therefore  
humbly request, Your Excellency will  
cause enquiry to be made in the premises,  
in order that the Promontory may be  
preserved for the purposes of shelter, and  
of erecting a Light House thereon.
